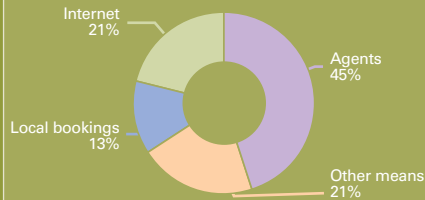


Status: France 2007

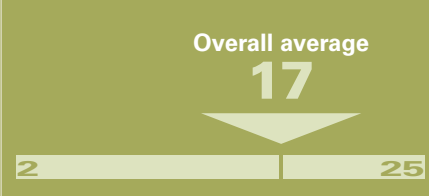

Intensity of study (hours studied per week)

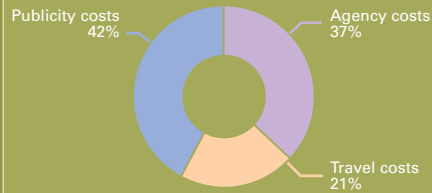


Key points

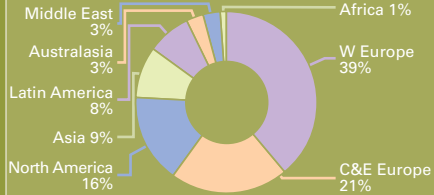
- Number of participating organisations in the France survey: **20**
- Total number of students at the organisations in 2007: **25,590**
- Total number of student weeks in 2007, estimated: **143,304**
- Overall average length of stay in weeks: **5.6**
- Average cost of a one-month course, excluding accommodation: **€911 (US\$1,437)**
- Average cost of residential accommodation per week: **€201 (US\$317)**
- Average cost of host family accommodation per week: **€207 (US\$326)**
- Average commission paid on a language course: **21 per cent**
- **Three** institutions paid commission on accommodation (averaging **eight per cent**)

Marketing budget by region (overall %)



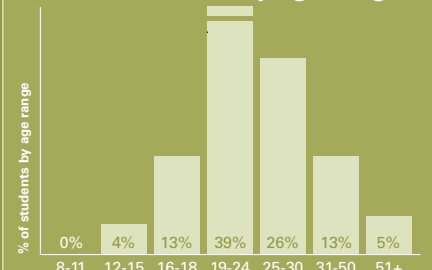
Top nationalities in France by student weeks, 2007



Observations

- Students from Western Europe appear to be more numerous than any other continent, however, the USA clung on to the top nationality spot with a 12.6 per cent share of the market. Interestingly, Mexican and Korean students, not placed in 2006, made their debut this year with a 3.2 per cent and 2.7 per cent share respectively.
- 45 per cent of all new business sourced. This trend was also reflected in total marketing spend by sector, where agency costs grew by 11 percentage points to 37 per cent.
- 25-to-30 year olds continue to grow as an age group, up from 18.5 per cent to 26 per cent in 2007. But the number of 12-to-15 year olds studying in France dropped by 13 percentage points to just four per cent.
- Agent usage increased by four percentage points this year, accounting for
