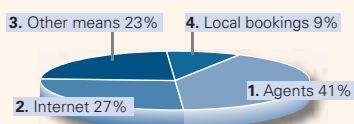


# Status: Italy 2004

## Intensity of study (hours studied per week)

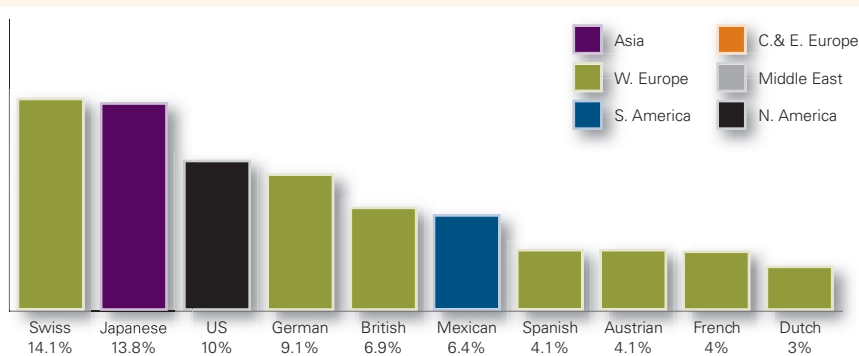


## Key points

- Number of participating organisations in the Italy survey: **15**
- Total number of students at the organisations in 2004: **8,494**
- Total number of student weeks in 2004, estimated: **61,157**
- Overall average length of stay in weeks: **7.2**
- Average cost of a one-month course, excluding accommodation: **€578 (US\$720)**
- Average cost of residential accommodation per week: **€173 (US\$215)**
- Average cost of host family accommodation per week: **€178 (US\$222)**
- Average commission paid on a language course: **20 per cent** (from 15 to 25)
- **One** institution paid commission on accommodation (of 5 per cent)

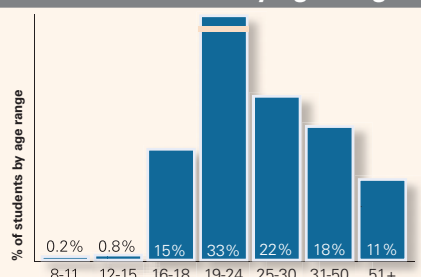
## Top student nationalities in Italy by student weeks, 2004



## Observations

- There were 15 school participants in our Status survey this year compared with nine last year. Some trends remained unchanged, such as trends in intake according to age. However, those students using an agent dropped from 48% last year to 41% this year. Local bookings also declined and the Internet made up the shortfall, now accounting for 27% of bookings.
- The cost of tuition and accommodation had not altered much year on year although the US\$ value had increased. Residential accommodation had changed the most in price, up from €137 to €173.
- The Swiss were top of the pile this year, while they did not figure last year. Koreans were missing from the mix this year, while Japan and the US remained important.
- The average length of stay was up to 7.2 weeks from 4.2 weeks last year.
